- Thesis: Conceptualizing Obligations to Preserve Cultural Heritage as Human Rights
- In recent years, global institutions like the UN and UNESCO have increasingly treated obligations to preserve cultural heritage as obligations to uphold human rights. Owing to the relative novelty of this approach, little work has been done to see what exactly such rights would be and how this treatment of cultural heritage could be justified. Not only is it unclear what the foundations of human rights to cultural heritage are or what precisely such rights ought to entail, but it is equally uncertain what is meant by cultural heritage in the first place. In light of this, in this thesis my aims are the following: (i) provide a philosophically robust definition of cultural heritage and its social value that could serve as a foundation of the human rights approach to cultural heritage; (ii) building on this understanding of cultural heritage, provide a systematic conceptual analysis of obligations to preserve cultural heritage understood in the language of human rights and assess their implications for global policy making.
